NEW BUSINESS & ADOPTION OF ORDINANCES AND RESOLUTIONS

Discussion and Possible Action Regarding a Sunroc Mass Grading Conditional Use Permit for Property having access to the Frontage Road south of Summit Ridge Parkway

Director Bond reported Mr. Wayne Humphries, representing Sunroc Corporation, is requesting a Conditional Use Permit for mass grading in the Summit Ridge Commercial areas (see attached for memo and application).

Mr. Humphries reported the length of the proposed license is based on the time frame needed to sale the materials from both sites. A discussion was held as to the requirement of the asphalt requirement.

After the discussion, Council Member Mecham moved to grant the Conditional Use Permit for the Sunroc Mass Grading Operation on the Greek Streak Foundation property with the following conditions:

- 1) Provide appropriate bonding for the site which will be separate from and not tied to currently approved permits that are located in the vicinity.
- 2) Must provide 40 feet of pavement on the property at ingress and egress point to minimize the impacts of dust and tracking.

Discussion and Possible Action Regarding the Safe Walking Routes to School Project on 300 West between 100 North and 560 North

Engineer Beagley reported after some delay, the Right of Way (ROW) acquisition phase for the 300 West Safe Routes to School (SRTS) project is nearing completion. All ROW documents have been fully executed and the ROW has been certified by UDOT and by the City. We expect payments to property owners to go out from UDOT very soon and thereafter documents being recorded at the County.

The design is complete and ready for bidding.

Due to the ROW delays and subsequent market price escalations, the project is looking to possibly be over budget for construction by approximately \$77,000.00.

The City approached the original UDOT funding SRTS Department to determine if there may be additional program funding available to assist in constructing he project. UDOT has agreed to fund

an additional \$46,000.00 of the additional \$77,000.00 amount needed. They are asking the City to cover the additional "match" amount in the amount of 30,000.00 (basically this would double our original match amount).

Keeping in mind that the estimated increased construction amount is just that, an engineering & UDOT staff construction estimate. Competitively bidding for the project may prove more favorable, thereby bringing the projected construction costs in lower than currently estimated. In fact, we received word from UDOT that is appears that the higher construction pricing they have been experiencing recently, seems to be retracting/easing slightly. This could/would be good news for our SRTS project as well as other upcoming Santaquin City road projects.

The Engineering Department respectfully ask that the Council approve up to an additional \$30,000.00 of funding for the construction of the project. If the project does not need/use all of the additional \$77,000.00, the City would be at the same 60%/40% split for whatever the amount of the overage up to the additional \$39,808.00.

Council Member Miller was told the proposed project could potentially allow 300 West be returned to a 2 lane road. He was also told that getting to this point in the project process has been extremely time consuming and "painful". He voiced his concern with the City spending money to install improvements that will benefit the current property owners. Engineer Beagley reported when the project is complete the City will receive benefit at 8 or 9 times the dollar amount the City will spend. Engineer Beagley indicated he has never been involved in a project that has required so much time. It was reported at this time; it would cost the City more to walk away from the project than to contribute the additional fund for the project.

Re: Sunroc Request for Mass Grading Conditional Use Permit Zone: Planned Community (PC)

Mr. Wayne Humphries, representing Sunroc Corporation, (see attached application) is requesting a Conditional Use Permit for mass grading in the Summit Ridge commercial areas. The proposed area is located adjacent to the current mass grading operation located south of Summit Ridge Parkway. Sunroc currently owns and operates an existing gravel operation to the south of the proposed area located within Juab County. However, they are requesting a separate conditional use permit for this property.

Santaquin City Code (§10-6-28: Gravel, Sand, Earth Extraction, and Mass Grading) requires that a plan be provided indicating how potential impacts may be reduced with the proposed mass grading project.





D. Location, size, and legal description of the area from which the removal is to be made.

The entrance to the property is located along Old Mona Hwy 91 approximately 0.4 miles south of Summit Ridge Parkway on the west side of the road. The total size of the property to be graded is 26.41 acres and is more particularly described as Utah County Parcel Tax ID # 32:021:0020.

E. Type of materials or resources to be excavated, processed, stockpiled, or hauled away.

Bank-run will be processed into sand, gravel, road base, and engineered fill.

F. Proposed method of removal and general haul route.

Sand, gravel and rock will be removed with heavy equipment--namely bulldozers, excavators and front-end loaders. The material will be processed, sized and stockpiled on site until it is removed. Removal will take place by loading the processed material onto over-the-road trucks with a front-end loader. The haul rout will move through Sunroc's adjacent property, across Sunroc's truck scales and out onto Old Mona Hwy 91.

G. General types of equipment to be used.

Bulldozers, front-end loaders, excavators and crushing equipment.

H. The estimated time frame to complete operations and the number of phases where appropriate.

There is an estimated 550,000 tons of cut on the proposed site; at Sunroc's current removal rates, it would take approximately two years to remove this material. Sunroc is finishing up a mass grading operation on the adjacent property to the north (HG Utah's Property) and will remove the stockpiles from the HG Utah property before it begins removal of any of the proposed material. Due to this fact, the anticipated completion will be late fall, 2022. However, upon approval of the conditional use, Sunroc will begin grading and processing the bank-run from the Greek Streak Foundation site into stockpiles so they are ready to sell the material once the HG Utah materials have been exhausted.

I. As a part of the application, the applicant shall submit a plan of operation and will be expected to comply with such a plan during the time for which a permit is issued. Said plan of operation shall include a topographic survey of the existing parcel drawn to a scale of one inch to one hundred feet (1":100') and prepared by a registered civil engineer or land surveyor with contour intervals not to exceed five feet (5') based on United States geological survey datum. The drawing shall also clearly show the area to be excavated or mass graded, including existing features and roads within five hundred feet (500') of all property lines, areas for stockpiling, maintenance areas, berms, fencing, and similar use areas. The plan of operation shall be accompanied by a projected schedule of operation, including the following specific dates:

Please see accompanying production schedule and LEI exhibits.

1. Commencement and projected completion of excavation or mass grading operations provided by the plan of operation:

Sunroc will begin grading and stockpiling material upon approval of the conditional use permit. It is anticipated that all operations will be completed by December, 2022.

2. Commencement and projected completion of erosion and drainage control measures to be instituted during excavation or mass grading operations:

Sunroc has an active SWPPP permit for the site (UTR272731) and conducts routine inspections to insure compliance with regulations including visual and sampling of water during rain events. Berms will be constructed on the outside edges of the grading area to prevent any offsite flows. The slope of the floor will run contiguous with the slope of the property to the north.

3. Commencement and projected completion of fencing, roads, utilities, or any other structures or improvements to be located on the site as provided by the plan of operation.

All roads leading into and away from the site are currently in place. If permitted to use the current north-east entrance, Sunroc will immediately place locking gates at the entrance. When Sunroc has completed its operations on the HG Utah property, it will move its stand-up water tank and service to the Greek Streak Property.

- J. As a part of the application, the applicant shall submit a site plan and will be expected to comply with such a plan during the time for which a permit is issued. Site plans for such projects shall provide a complete set of plans, which include:
- 1. All necessary detail drawings;

All such operations shall be required to put forth a bond for the reclamation of the project to ensure the adequate restoration of the site to an acceptable degree for further use or development except when part of a larger project where:

- A. The site will be developed as a part of, and consistent with, the rest of the larger project; and
- B. Bonding has been put forth for the larger project.

Sunroc has a current bond in place with Utah County for rehabilitation of 27.7 acres in that area and can adjust this bond to cover the additional acreage as needed.

Site Reclamation Plan

During the reclamation phase the site will be contoured to match the elevations and slopes established by the grading plan (see LEI exhibits), topsoil will be redistributed and a city approved seed mixture will be applied.

Backfilling:

Near the conclusion of the grading process, the site will be evaluated to establish a balance between areas that need to be cut and areas to be filled. Areas that need to be filled will be raised with suitable material from the site. All fill materials will be tested so moisture-density relationships can be established. Compaction levels will be established, and tests will be conducted, by an independent geotechnical firm.

Topsoil Redistribution and Seeding:

Topsoil from the site will be collected and stored as a berm on the perimeter of the property and will be draped over slopes and spread over the floor of the disturbed area during the final reclamation phase of the project. If need be, the topsoil will be scarified. A seed mix, approved by Santaquin City, will be distributed along the slopes and floor area. Typically the seeding will take place in the late fall.

Surface Water and Erosion:

Due to the porous nature of the soil in the area and the slopes established by the grading plan, we don't believe surface water runoff will be an issue. If areas do show signs of erosion we will mitigate the erosion with established industry practices.

Nuisance Mitigation:

Dust

Sunroc operates under a state-issued air quality permit and strictly adheres to approved opacity, fugitive dust and emissions standards set forth in the permit. Sunroc has a stand-up water tank on site from which it pulls water to keep dust to a minimum on roads and stockpiles. All processing equipment is equipped with a dust suppression system. When winds are excessive, Sunroc may also elect to shut down its operations until the winds calm to a tolerable level.

Noise

The effects of noise are kept to a minimum by placing berms and stockpiles in strategic locations to help deflect and muffle the noise, and operations are not conducted before 7:00am or after 7:00pm. Trucks will exit the site to the south, away from nearby homes.

Odors

Sunroc is not aware of any odors that will be released by its operations.

Lighting

Because operations are only conducted from 7:00am to 7:00pm, only a minimum amount of lighting we be necessary. During the winter months, when days are short, lighting will be used in the mornings and evenings but will be positioned to eliminate negative stray effects. Security cameras on site use infrared light for monitoring and therefore no overnight lighting will be necessary.

Drainage Plan

The following drainage plan is provided to explain how Sunroc intends to deal with storm water drainage in the proposed mass grading area.

Water drainage on the Greek Streak property currently flows from the west to the east, toward the frontage road and further into the Greek Streak Property. As mass grading progresses, care will be taken to ensure that this natural flow is allowed to continue.


Once the floor of the area to be graded is established, the grade will run with that of the adjacent property to the north, and water will flow in a north-easterly direction. This could potentially result in water drainage making its way onto adjacent properties.

To mitigate this potential, Sunroc will place a berm along the north perimeter of the graded area to catch any flows which might make their way there. Due to the rocky and porous nature of the soil in this area, it is anticipated that standing water will seep into the ground fairly quickly, probably within a couple of days, so standing water will not be a problem.

Sunroc will also operate under a state-issued Storm Water Pollution Prevention Plan, or SWPPP, while it performs the mass grading work. Commensurate with the SWPPP plan, Sunroc will routinely monitor storm water on site and take immediate action to prevent its contamination. Best management practices will be implemented to ensure SWPPP compliance.

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
