Dear Santaguin City Council,

We are writing today because we have safety concerns for our students who live on the North side of Main Street and attend Santaquin Elementary, specifically our students who cross or walk north on 300 West.

We have approximately 442 Santaquin Elementary students who live on the North side of Main Street. Based on the map approximately 232 of those students could use 300 West to travel home. This past week we counted our students walking home on one day. We had 164 students cross Main Street. Of those, 120 walked north on 300 West, while twenty crossed 300 West and proceed east along Main Street.

You may know that during the school year, we have taught our students how to walk safely home. We held a safety week where parents stood at key locations on 300 West instructing our students about the correct place to walk on and cross the streets. We were pleased to have Officer Johnson participate with us on a number of those days. We are also very grateful to the city for removing the irrigation pipe that made it difficult for students riding bikes or scooters to stay on the side walk.

As a PTA and as parents we feel these efforts alone are not enough. We still see problem areas and have witnessed unsafe situations. We believe the recommendations below are needed to improve the safety of our students as they travel to and from school.

- Place curb and gutter along both sides of 300 West. This will give our students safe passage on either side of the road.
- Add curb and gutter to just the east side of 100 North to 200 North.
- Make 300 West a one way road going north from Main Street to 400 North permanently or between the hours of 8:00AM and 4:00PM. Decreasing the amount of traffic on 300 West.
- Make 300 West a one way road going south from Main Street to 100 South between the hours of 8:00AM and 4:00PM. Eliminating cross traffic, therefore making it safer for our students to cross 300 West along Main Street.
- Increase the length of the school zone by moving the lights further east between 200
   West and 300 West, causing the traffic to slow down sooner.

 Paint crosswalks on 300 West and Main Street, 200 North, and 300 North. Do not repaint the crosswalk on 100 North on the west side of the intersection. This will encourage students to cross to the east side of 300 West and continue traveling north on the pedestrian path.

We appreciate your time. We are happy to discuss this further with you, hoping we can work together to keep our students safe.

  - Stone Hollow Plat C under construction. The Ekins family was re-engaged about the secondary access and is favorable toward it. A draft agreement was sent for their attorney to review.
