#### MINUTES OF A COUNCIL MEETING HELD IN THE COUNCIL CHAMBERS AUGUST 14, 2013

Council Member Steele moved to approve the Consent Agenda. Council Member Hunsaker seconded the motion. Council Members Broadhead, Carr, Hunsaker, Linford, and Steele voted unanimously in favor of approving the Consent Agenda.

#### FORUM, BID OPENINGS, AWARDS, AND APPOINTMENTS

Mr. Houser addressed the Mayor and Council. He said "200 and some years ago we hung the British and shot them for giving us a 3% tax rate. Now you want to give us a 100% tax hike? We are the dairy herd and you guys want to milk us for every penny that's available." Mayor DeGraffenried thanked him for his comments.

Mr. Durfey addressed the Council. He indicated he would like to speak with regard to the tax increase and the way it was proposed. He said "My personal opinion is, I work for the County Government. I understand how the budget works. I understand we need money to provide for the citizenry. What I would propose is the manner in which those monies are going to be generated and allocated. Everybody here knows if you put money in a general fund, this Council and the next Council are not bound by what you decide tonight. Those funds, even though they are put in a restricted account, can be changed. They can be used for other purposes. We all understand the need for infrastructure. I would propose you strongly consider bonding for the roads so those funds are designated and used for that purpose. They can't be raided by someone else who wants to come in and change a decision".

Mr. Adcock addressed the Council. He stated he wanted to remind them of some statistics he "brought up last time. 44% of your community is under the age of 18 and 20% of us are age 60 or older. Some of us do live on fixed incomes of some kind. I hope that you have really considered the impact of what this tax hike would be to the Citizens. I hope you have explored some opportunities this past week since the Public Hearing and I hope that you also consider at least doing this incrementally instead of maybe 100% if we do need a tax hike then maybe doing 50%. See what that does to the budget and to your funds then also reevaluate, the next Council could reevaluate next year. These things have a lasting impact on the community. During that meeting, I think I understood that we have an impact fee for parks and because of that impact fee we are mandated to provide the parks because the money can't be used for something else. We don't have an impact fee for roads. We don't need additional parks, at least that is what came out in the meeting last time we had the public meeting. Why don't we eliminate the impact fee for the parks so we are not mandated by money that we are getting to go something with that we don't need and establish a road impact fee?"

#### **UNFINISHED BUSINESS**

Discussion and possible action with regard to the establishment of the Santaquin City Property Tax Rate and/or possible action with regard to road maintenance user fees.

Mayor DeGraffenried reminded those in the audience that this is the time for the Council to speak and make a decision on the proposed tax increase.

Council Member Carr reported he appreciates the letters, e-mails and phone calls. He acknowledges there is a problem with roads. He proposed a 25% tax increase with a budget review. He stated he will be here for another 2 years and is willing to go through this process again if needed. "I hope we as a City Council can start somewhere make our roads stop going downhill. That's not an option for us anymore. We still need to do what needs to be done to maintain and start going uphill. As a Council we would like to see this go uphill really fast. This is not what the Citizens want and I heard that last week."

Council Member Steele thanked everyone for attending. He stated the Construction Standards have improved at least 50% in the past 4 years. He voiced his support for a 25% increase if the money can be tied to the road repair. If this is not possible he would support bonding.

Council Member Broadhead said, "As I said earlier, when I reluctantly voted to go into this Truth in Taxation Hearing, I voted to go in as long as we could tie the money to the roads and it was guaranteed that it would not be gobbled up by future Councils. Our first option, my first option is to let the people bond or vote on it for a bond. There are some issues with that also in that you pay \$60,000 to \$80,000 per year in interest that could be used for roads. But I think to guarantee that it goes to the roads; that's the way to go. Just for some information, in 1998 the gas tax was 25 cents a gallon. I did some research. Gasoline was \$1.03 a gallon back then. So it was 25% of every gallon you bought was used for the B & C Roads which helps build the roads. Today it is still 26 cents and gasoline is almost \$4.

Roads tie right into that. Roads are made out of asphalt. Trucks have to haul it. They use fuel to get it there. I really think the legislature has let us down. I've talked to our Representative and he doesn't think anything is going to happen in the next 3 years. So we are not the only City facing this and it is going to get worse. However, after hearing Mr. Kester talk last week, his taxes are going to go from \$2000 to \$4000. He is a business. We are supposed to be business friendly here. I'm more in favor of a fee and I think the Citizens should vote on that. I think we can get by for a year, a year from this November and put it on the ballot".

Council Member Hunsaker thanked everyone for their attendance. He feels something should be done now instead of getting further behind. He would support up to a 50% increase in tax and budget cuts wherever possible.

Council Member Linford indicated he was not here last week but has had contact with a number of residents. He agrees with Council Member Hunsaker. He feels bonds are expensive. He is in favor of an increase in order to maintain the roads. He wanted the increase to be 100% but is willing to support 50% and believes 25% is not enough. He also stated the budget doesn't have room to be cut unless services are cut which will be detrimental to the residents.

Mayor DeGraffenried indicated he is not the person people think he is. He isn't passionate about raising taxes. He recommended the increase to be in the neighborhood of 50% as well as implementing an additional fee. He reminded those in attendance that impact fees have restrictions also.

Council Member Carr stated he doesn't want to bond but thinks they have a responsibility as a Council to maintain the roads.

Council Member Broadhead reminded the Council Members that a Special Service District could be created by the City Council but the funds should to be voted on by the people.

Council Member Carr moved to establish a Santaquin City property tax rate of 32.5%. Council Member Steele seconded the motion. Council Member Carr amended the motion to state a 32.5% increase in the tax rate. Council Member Steele seconded the amendment. The vote was as follows:

The motion passed by majority vote, with 4 in favor and 1 opposed.

Council Member Steele moved that the City Council of Santaquin City create a Special Service District, in accordance with Utah State Law, for the purpose of road maintenance and road improvements and that by the November 2014 election there be an initiative on the ballot that would raise the Special Service District's mill levy rate and lower the Santaquin City mill levy rate by the same amount thereby redirecting the tax revenue collected for this

purpose into the Service District for this intended use. Council Member Linford seconded the motion. Council Member Broadhead, Carr, Hunsaker, Linford, and Steele voted unanimously in favor of the motion.
