MINUTES OF A WORK SESSION HELD IN THE COUNCIL CHAMBERS JANUARY 16, 2013

The meeting was called to order by Mayor James E. DeGraffenried at 6:02 pm. Council Members attending: Keith Broadhead, Matthew Carr, Kirk Hunsaker, James Linford, and Rick Steele.

Others attending: City Manager Ben Reeves, Director Dennis Marker, Director Dennis Howard, Representative Marc Roberts, Parlant Technology Representatives Dan Nelson and Conrad Hildabrant, and other unidentified individuals.

Representative Roberts introduced himself to the Mayor and Council Members. He indicated the session begins in a couple of weeks and would like to have an open working relationship with the leaders of the Cities. He reported he had received e-mails from Dirk Clayson who is a County Commissioner in Kanab. He wanted to address issues of Santaquin Canyon. City Manager Reeves indicated a few years ago the Forest Service applied for and received grant money to make access improvements/management up Santaquin Canyon. What actually happened was installation of boulders that prevents access to parts of the canyon that has been accessable for a long period of time. City Manager Reeves in conjunction with Legal Counsel Rich are working with the Forest Service to remedy the problem. Representative Roberts reported he will be sponsoring a bill addressing land issues. This bill would clarify who has the jurisdiction over federal lands. The Mayor and Council will pass a Resolution in support of Representative Roberts' efforts.

Council Member Broadhead was told Representative Roberts "is working on gun control" issues also.

Council Member Hunsaker was told at this point Representative Roberts would not be working on HOA issues.

DISCUSSION ITEMS

Presentation - Mass Communications Systems - Parlant Technology

Director Howard introduced Mr. Nelson. Director Howard indicated he watched the technology demonstration during a dispatch meeting. The technology could be used as a tool for emergency communication.

Mr. Nelson asked what area of communication the Council Members would like to improve. Council Member Steele would like to keep the residents more informed.

City Manager Reeves introduced Mr. Hildabrant, past City Manager of Cedar Hills. Mr. Hildabrant reported that Cedar Hills uses this technology. In the event of an emergency the entire community could be reached with information. This technology could be used every day to keep the residents informed of City wide issues.

It was said that Parlant Technology provides community relationship management and mass communication services for State and Local Governments, K-12, Healthcare, etc. They currently service over 10,000 organizations that use their service to communicate

with over 9,000,000 people. They are more than just a notification service because through their service, you can manage your community outreach efforts, the community activity, and you can also perform surveys to receive valuable feedback. With their service, you can easily schedule a message to be delivered via telephone, email, fax, and SMS at the same time. Spanish Fork City recently signed on for their service to help them reduce the number of negative accounts they have each month as well as to reduce the number of shutoffs that they have each month. Heber City has been able to cut their water shutoff costs in half since using our service and the Santa Clara Assistant City Manager was able to warn the residents of a dike failure even though he was at the Bountiful Golf Course during the League of Cities and Towns Golf Tournament. Some additional ways that their service is helping cities be more efficient include:

- Business License Renewals
- Winter Parking Restrictions
- City Council Meeting Reminders (Change of day and time)
- Surveys
- Water Main Breaks or for any reason that requires the city to shut off water.
- Parks and Recreation (Flag football reminders, baseball game cancellations, etc.)

Newsletters are expensive to produce and mail.
