- 1: Minutes of a regular Santaquin City Council held on Tuesday, <u>July 2, 1985</u>, at City Hall. Mayor Sandra Peterson presided at the meeting and the following Councilmen were present: Marilyn Clayson, Clara Goudy, Dan Olson, Grant Pay* (entered the meeting at 7:15 p.m.) and Art Adcock** (entered the meeting at 8:15 p.m.). City Recorder/Clerk Sam Sellers recorded the meeting.
- 2: Mayor Peterson called the meeting to order at 7:05 p.m. Councilman Goudy offered the invocation and led the pledge of allegience.
- 3: Prior minutes. *Councilman Pay entered the meeting at this point.

 Councilman Clayson moved that the minutes of the meetings on June 4, 1985, June 18, 1985, and June 26, 1985, be approved with the clarifications and Councilman Olson seconded. The motion passed unanimously.
- 4: Ben & Carol Lee proposed annexation of personal property. The Council explained that this property lies approximately 300 West and 400 North. Mr. Sellers explained that the city would annex the property during this meeting and then zone the property during the next meeting. He said that when the Lees decided to divide off their property, they would need to go before the Planning & Zoning Committee and City Council again to subdivide their three (3) lots for sell and the city would then set the requirements for the water lines, etc. The Council told the Lees that the city would require a six inch (6") water line to service this area, which the Lees would be required to install.
- 5: Councilman Olson moved that the city annex the Lees property located at approximately 300 West 400 North, about 3 acres, subject to the Lees submitting an annexation mylar map and turning two shares of Summitt Creek Irrigation & Canal Co. water stock in to the city. Two acres would be zoned T-5 and one acre would be zoned residential. Councilman Pay seconded the motion and it passed unanimously.
- 6: The Mayor instructed Mr. Sellers to place the zoning of this property on the next agenda.
- 7: 1985-1986 Salary adjustments. Councilman Goudy moved that the salaries for the city employees for the beginning of fiscal year 1985-1986 be as follows:

- 10: Councilman Clayson seconded the motion and it passed unanimously.
- 11: Bad debts and write offs for 1984-1985. The total amount reviewed by the Council to be written off was \$850.67. Councilman Olson moved that they be written off and Councilman Pay seconded. The motion passed unanimously.
- 12: Council business:
- 13: 1. Possibility of closing office 7/5/85 The Council authorized the office to be closed for the 5th of July.
- 14: **Councilman Adcock entered the meeting at this time.
- 15: 2. MAG contract on Senior Citizens Councilman Goudy moved that the city accept the 1985-1986 contract with the Mountainlands Association of Governments concerning the Senior Citizens. Councilman Pay seconded the motion and it passed unanimously.
- 16: 3. Fire hazard Mr. Sellers stated that some people have called the city concerning a fire hazard behind the cabins at about 50 South 100 West. He said that apparently there are some very dry weeds on the property.
 - : Councilman Pay Councilman Pay asked the Council who the city should have as its Grand Marshall in this year's parade. Many people were suggested, and the Council finally settled upon Clement Kester in recognition of his work during the 1983 and 1984 floods as the Santaquin Canyon Flood Committee Chairman.
- 18: Councilman Pay asked who the Council felt should lead off the parade with the flags. The Council suggested having the Eagle Scouts of the city do so.
- 19: Mike Olson, the Celebration Chairman, asked the Council if they wanted to emphasize the celebration as being the Santaquin Cherry Days Celebration. They indicated that they would.
- 20: Councilman Goudy Councilman Goudy explained that the representatives of the 4th Ward Scouts complained about others being allowed to sell fireworks in town. She said that they indicated that the city promised them the year before that they would be the only ones allowed to sell fireworks in the city, in other words they were saying the city would give them sole rights to sell fireworks. The Mayor and Council stated that they could not remember doing so.
- 21: Councilman Goudy asked if the Corner Mart had been told about not selling beer. Mr. Sellers said that he discussed this with Chief Knox, but did not know what transpired. He said that he did write a letter to the company and let them know about the city's concerns. Councilman Goudy asked if the city had received a report from Weights & Measures and the County Board of Health. Mr. Sellers said that the city has not yet received these. Councilman Goudy also indicated that there are some videos being used in the store. Mr. Sellers said that Vince Pillig explained to him that they would not be allowing vidoes

and, therefore, did not get a license for them.

- 22: Councilman Goudy explained that Lloyd Nelson, from Genola, had contacted her about a problem with his mother's grave. Councilman Clayson said that she was familiar with this problem and would take care of it.
- 23: Councilman Goudy explained that Mrs. Foster has some comp time earned and wanted to close the Library for the 4th and 5th of July. The Council felt this was OK.
- 24: Councilman Olson Councilman Olson explained that LaDue Scoville was present to discuss with the Council the complaint with the Public Service Commission.

 Mr. Scoville explained how the demand and power situation works with the meter on the city's well. He also explained that the city should weigh the options concerning the irrigation schedules and that the city might have a good case to get the well changed to irrigation status. Mr. Sellers was asked to work the differences in the rates up for the Council and send it to them.
- 25: Councilman Adcock moved that the meeting be extended until the business is completed and Councilman Clayson seconded. The motion passed unanimously.
- 26: Councilman Pay asked about the large increases in the street lights and Mr. Scoville stated that these lights are subject to rate increases as well.
- 27: Mr. Sellers was asked to write UP&L a letter requesting a light to be placed in at 300 South 300 East and to replace a globe at 200 East 200 North.
- 28: Councilman Clayson Councilman Clayson showed the Council the plans for the bucking shutes. She said that the bill would come to about \$800.00 more than the previous authorization and moved that the additional \$800.00 be approved. Councilman Olson seconded the motion and it passed unanimously.
- 29: Councilman Clayson explained that Mayor Haymond has not contacted her yet.
- 30: <u>Councilman Olson</u> Councilman Olson explained that Santaquin has been approved as the National Trials site set for September.
