Minutes of a regular Santaquin City Council meeting held on Wednesday, July 20, 1983, at City Hall.

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Inasmuch as two of the City Councilmen were involved in a fire in Elberta and one Councilman was excused because of a death in the family, there was not a quorum to conduct business at the regularly scheduled time of commencement at 8:00 P.M. At 8:30 P.M., the Mayor excused the scheduled agenda items. At 8:50 P.M., the two Councilmen who were fighting the fire arrived.

- Inasmuch as a quorum was in attendance (Councilmen Sherman Jones, Lamar Openshaw and Grant Pay) Mayor Sandra Peterson called the meeting to order at 8:50 P.M., to handle the Council business items.
- Mayor Peterson announced that another (meeting to handle the agenda items would be held on Wednesday, July 27, 1983.
  - 1. Sale of Police car to Genola Mayor Peterson recommended the sale of the White Dodge Police car to Genola, as is, for \$300.00. Councilman Jones moved that the sale be approved and Councilman Openshaw seconded. The motion passed unanimously.
  - 2. Petition for Forest Service to replace road Councilman Jones indicated that there is talk going around that the Forest Service is not going replace the road up Santaquin Canyon for three years. Mayor Peterson asked Councilman Jones what he thought ought to be done and he said that someone should discuss this with them and determine if it were true. Councilman Jones said that if this were true that it is a disgrace and that Santaquin is always the last to benefit from anything. Councilman Openshaw said that he has heard that they are never going to replace the road. Mr. Sellers said that he has heard that there will be a road going up the Canyon to Upper Trumbolt and down the Canyon from the upper road to Tinney Flats, but nothing in between.

Mayor Peterson said that she felt this is the prettiest canyon in the State. Mayor Peterson said that she would meet with the County Commission and the Forest Service about this. Councilman Jones said that he felt a petition from the residents might make a difference.

- 3. <u>Dance permit</u> Wayne Smith requested a dance permit for August 5, 1983. Councilman Jones moved that this be approved and Councilman Openshaw seconded. The motion passed unanimously.
- \*4. Genola Letter Mayor Peterson asked if each Councilman (Had received the letter from Genola concerning their not wanting contracts for fire or police protection from Santaquin. Mr. Sellers said that he had given each a copy. Mr. Sellers said that he thought the City had already fought one fire in Genola and asked how this would be handled. Councilman Openshaw said that he had heard the County calling Goshen and Lehi this night to assist in a fire in Genola. On his scanner

Councilman Jones said that the County should pick up the tab. Mr. Sellers said that the County is not paying the City anything for

fighting fires in Genola.

Councilman Jones suggested having Councilman Olson bring back a recommendation to the Council.

5. Business licenses - The following licenses were reviewed:

Councilman Openshaw moved that these licenses be approved and Councilman Pay seconded. The motion passed unanimously.

6. Debris Basin FEMA - Mr. Sellers said that FEMA has estimated that it would cost about \$353,925 to empty the basin. He said that the City's 25% share would be \$88,481.25, which is 26% of the current General Fund operating budget. Councilman Jones said that the State might pick up half of this. Mr. Sellers said that he has contacted Senator Orrin Hatch's office about this and see if there might be additional sources of funds for this type of work. Mr. Sellers said that he has discussed this with Alan Damron, who is the State liason with FEMA, and told him that Santaquin could not handle this high of an expense.

Mr. Sellers said that Senator Hatch's office let him know that the Governor has a \$50 million disaster aid fund which has not been touched yet.

- 7. Fire hydrant by the new Church Mr. Sellers said that person who is placing the fire hydrant in by the new LDS Church had contacted him. This person said that if he put the hydrant where it was suggested he put it, it would be sticking six feet into the air and four feet of fill would have to be placed against Utah Power & Light's fence. Mr. Sellers was told to have him put this flush with the top of the existing ground.
- 8. Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, Juab County Mr. Sellers said that Kendall, the farmer who experienced flood damage to his cropland to the West of I-15, had checked on this and they would pay up to 64% of the damages. Kendall also said that there was only \$150,000 in the fund and would be apportioned on a severity of damage basis.

Councilman Olson entered into the meeting at 9:10 P.M.

- 9. <u>State Firemen dues</u> Councilman Olson moved that the City pay the dues for the State Firemen and Councilman Pay seconded. The motion passed unanimously.
- 10. New water line placement Councilman Jones reported that most of

the hook-ups to the new eight inch line down 200 North and Lark Lane have been made and the people have more pressure than ever before. He also mentioned that Doyle Crook has been after him to replace the asphalt in front of his home. Mayor Peterson asked why the City should have to replace this as it is City property and she feels people take this risk by placing asphalt, etc. on public property. Councilman Openshaw said that he felt the City ought to measure the road and asphalt at least the 20 feet for the roadway. Councilman Jones said that the people on the road paid for this on a special improvement district. Mr. Sellers said that this would only have included that in the roadway property.

11. <u>Dance ordinance review</u> - The Council reviewed the dance ordinance and Mayor Peterson asked that a Public Hearing be held on Wednesday, August 3, 1983.

Mayor Peterson asked how this would effect the dance at the Park for the celebration. Mr. Sellers said that it would not be in effect at this time, but they would still have to apply for a permit to sell beer.

The Council suggested that the wording in Section 4 be such that it is understood that the Police may suspend the permit until a review can be held or six months, whichever is more.

Mr. Sellers said that he didn't feel that there should be a misdemeanor charge connected to the ordinance because of the other decisions available in Section 5, Step 3. He said that this would keep the Council in control, instead of mandating control to the City Justice of the Peace.

Mayor Peterson left the meeting at 9:30 P.M.

Councilman Olson moved that all the bills except Wolfe's be paid. This is to be held until the next meeting. Councilman Openshaw seconded the motion and it passed unanimously.

Councilman Olson. Councilman Olson stated that he felt if the City gets a call from Genola to fight wthe fire, they should go out of courtesy. Mr. Sellers asked how this expense would be paid. It was determined that the County would probably not pay for this. Mr. Sellers asked if the Fire Department has already fought a fire in Genola near Warm Springs and he said they had fought two fires there which extended into the County.

Mr. Sellers said that Genola is an incorporated town and the County only pays for fires in the unincorporated areas.

A recess was called at 9:45 P.M. The meeting was called back to order at 9:50 P.M.

Councilman Olson stated that Genola has petitioned the County to take away some of Santaquin's County fire protection area. Councilman Olson said that they have two trucks, an old brush truck and a tanker type truck. Councilman Olson said that this would reduce Santaquin's income. He said that he had to go to a meeting the next night after this meeting to fight for Santaquin's area. Councilman Jones said that he felt the County should make them prove themselves first.

Councilman Olson said that Santaquin is called out on these fires anyway. Mr. Sellers said that Santaquin ought to let the County know that there would be charge for backing up Genola when called for. Councilman Olson said that the City is not being paid to fight for Genola as it is. Mr. Sellers suggested that Councilman Olson let the County Commission know that Santaquin is backing up Genola within Genola's City limits now and to ask how they will take care of County fires.

Councilman Olson also suggested getting hold of the State underwriter concerning Santaquin's having no contract with Genola and letting their insurance rates increase. Mrs. Pay said that Cy Bylund has insured people in Genola and that their rates would be effected.

Councilman Jones asked if not fighting the fires in Genola for this next year would effect the Fire Department's budget. Mr. Sellers said that there was no money planned for this. Councilman Olson said that Genola hadn't paid for a fire fought in Genola for a few years now.

Councilman Olson said that if a fire call comes from the County dispatch, they should go to fight the fire, but if it comes from a resident in Genola, then they will not go. He said that all calls from Genola would be checked through the County before they leave. Mr. Sellers said that they would then start to call dispatch if they need Santaquin. He said that Councilman Olson ought to let the County know that they will be charged \$300 for each fire Santaquin is dispatched to in Genola. Mr. Sellers said that the County could not balk because Santaquin does not have an agreement with anyone to fight fires in Genola, and if the County dispatches Santaquin then the County should pay.

Councilman Olson said that the only trucks which would qualify a City for a good rating with the State underwriter are a hook and ladder truck and a pumper truck which will pump over 1,000 gallons per minuted. He said that the State will not even recognize their fire department without these two trucks. He said that they shouldn't even be able to qualify for the County and feels that they are going to be parasites to Santaquin until this is taken care of.

Councilman Olson said that the Santaquin's firemen won't fight fires in Genola on the basis Genola has outlined, as they don't feel like doing this for free. Councilman Olson said that he would contact the State Fire Marshall.

<u>Councilman Openshaw.</u> Councilman Openshaw stated that Robert Gardner had contacted him and said that the City would be receiving a letter from their attorney in answer to the City Attorney's letter.

Councilman Jones. Councilman Jones indicated that he felt the water hook-up for the new resolution should be \$400 if the hook-up is on the same side of the road and \$550 if the road has to be crossed. The Council felt good about this.

Councilman Olson moved that the meeting be adjourned and Councilman Openshaw seconded. The motion passed unanimously at 9:55 P.M.
