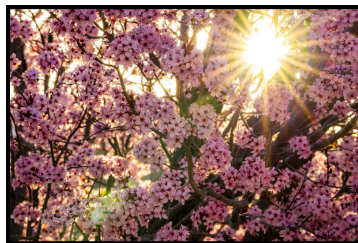

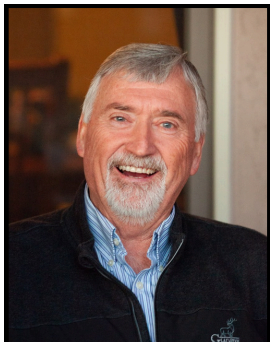

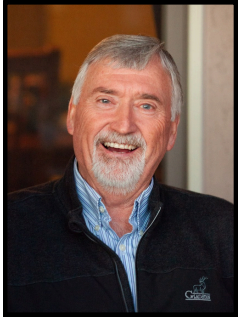

A Message from the Mayor: Santaquin City Budget & Public Safety Update  
Summer is upon us, and with it comes the steady runoff from our mountain snowpack. Fortunately, as in recent years, the runoff is occurring in a controlled and orderly fashion. At this time, there are no concerns about heavy flows or flooding.

As you may recall, we raised property taxes two years ago to help address critical funding needs for Public Safety staffing and vehicle replacements. We are now at a point where we need to add one additional police officer and one full-time fire department position to continue providing the level of safety our growing community expects and deserves.

The Tentative Budget, approved in May 2025, includes funding for both of these essential positions. Thanks to our collective efforts over the past 3½ years to grow Santaquin's business base, we've seen a healthy increase in sales tax revenue. This success allows us to fund more than half the cost of these new positions. However, to fully fund them, a modest property tax adjustment is required.

Under the Tentative Budget, the proposed property tax increase would average about \$2.17 per month—or roughly \$26.04 per year—for the median valued Santaquin household.


Over the past several years, we have worked hard to be fiscally responsible:


- We've reviewed and refined our budget to reduce unnecessary spending.
- We've pursued state and federal grants and advocated for and received additional investments in Santaquin from regional and state agencies.
- We've focused on creating a business-friendly environment that attracts and retains private sector growth.

Thanks to these efforts, Santaquin has welcomed over two dozen new businesses in the past seven years and supported the expansion of existing ones. This has strengthened and diversified our revenue base, thereby reducing long-term financial pressure on our residents.
