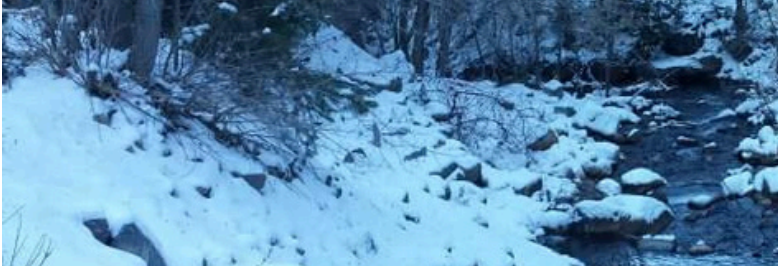

Snow Removal Guide

Public Works spends hours plowing, often through the night. Please be patient as they work their way around town. Residents are responsible to clear their own driveways, sidewalks and access areas in front of their homes and mail boxes. Please use caution around the snow plows.

Santaquin City has more than 77 miles of road. Main Street and SR 198 are plowed by UDOT. The City's three large snow plows are used in the following priority: First, the hillsides and main roads are cleared. After that, arterials (primary access roads) are plowed. Side streets and subdivisions are next, with dead ends and cul-de-sacs being plowed last. For small areas such as cul-de-sacs, where there is not enough room to turn one of the larger plows around, the City's smaller plow is brought in.

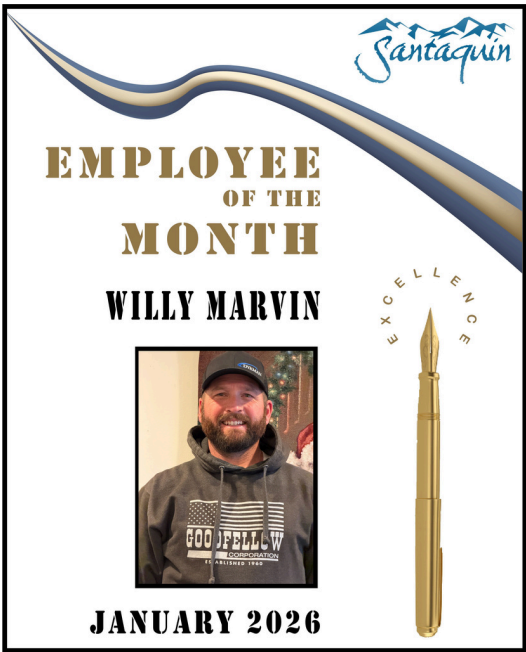

Happy New Year to one and all!

It is the first of January 2026! With all the mild weather leading up through this past fall to now, we are certainly hoping for some very good snowstorms.

Snow is critical to our community. Snow in the mountains provides the water for local farming and recharging our drinking water springs and aquifers. I want to ask you all to think about your neighbors as the storms will eventually bear down on us and especially those that are most vulnerable. Let's take care of each other as best we can and provide service to each other in every way we can. This is a great community, so please don't leave anyone out.

Four years ago, when I took over as the Mayor for Santaquin, I found we had a great new city hall under construction with many possibilities for enhancing much needed office space, a beautiful community center with a multi-purpose room and kitchen. Room for all our staff; engineering, building, planning and community services under one roof. I discovered the inside of the west wing of city hall had not been funded and was an uncompleted building shell on that side. Our hope for a new library upgrade and learning center, which would benefit our children, adults, youth, and our community would still need a lot of work.

I did not want to raise taxes to complete the library, nor did I want to raise money through bonds or other means that would still require each family and business to help get this project finished. We, as a council, were looking at several million dollars to finish the west wing of the building. But I also did not want to give up.

We petitioned the state legislature, several philanthropic organizations, and others to help us take on this monumental funding task. We've really had no luck in any of those avenues. We continue to try to find ways to pay for it without new taxes.

A presentation to the council, whom all jumped aboard, was to utilize the industrial zoned City owned land and create a new industrial park. Santaquin Peaks Industrial Park has successfully been implemented. The plan included our City CDRA (Community Development and Renewal Agency) which was designated and approved under state law to develop and create for multiple City purposes. The CDRA allows the board to work with businesses and industry to invite those who want to bring their company to Santaquin and to work with us.

This story is a wonderful City success! More will be shared in the coming months. I do want to say that in 2026, Santaquin City will have a new Library and learning center that will be state of the art. My goal right now is to ensure the final cost will be paid when we move in. What a gift to this City.
