#### In My Own Words: Mayoral Assignments



Just another happy message from your favorite city council member. With fall upon us and the end of the year fast approaching, I wanted to share some personal insights regarding our new mayoral assignments. As you may know, every two years each council member is given an opportunity to participate at a deeper level within the community at the request of the mayor. Our assignments pertain to various areas of city government and working with our local committees that are vital to the city's function and success. My assignments are focused on three specific areas: water, community service, and our beloved Orchard Days Celebration and Rodeo. I thought it might be interesting to share a few quick details from behind-the-scenes. I hope

everyone will appreciate the information and allow me to indulge in sharing my experiences. Each council member has a part of these mayoral assignments, and we all work very closely together. We each act as the liaison for one or more committees serving as the representative for the city council. Each assignment is a great opportunity for us to work more closely within the community while we carry out the tasks that were given to us.

As I mentioned, my first assignment pertains to water. In that role, I serve on both the SUVMWA Committee and Mount Nebo Water Agency Committee. Both of these boards interface with all of the south Utah County cities. Our primary focus is helping to develop and maintain sources for water shares that will not only meet our current demands, but will also keep us well established for future growth. I attend quarterly meetings to discuss critical matters and report back to our mayor and city council on the status of any outstanding issues or concerns.

Next on the list would be my role within Community Services, which encompasses recreation, community classes/sports. I also serve as the council liaison to the RAP Tax committee.

Another large area of focus within the Community Service assignment is the Orchard Days Celebration and Rodeo. Working within this area requires the full support of not only the entire city council, but also the mayor, city employees and staff members, as well as our many wonderful volunteers. It takes a full year of planning to organize all the fun events that are part of our celebration. From the first flag raising to the final fireworks show, coordinating these events requires a lot of teamwork. We begin this process each year starting immediately after the current celebration ends.



Everyone's participation is needed to ensure we meet our deadlines and bring together a memorable event for the community each year.

As a city council member, I want to personally acknowledge the great sacrifice and efforts from each person who is a part of this endeavor. I wish to also offer a special thanks to the city employees and staff, along with the many volunteers who provide critical support to us, without who's help, none of these events would be possible.

We are truly blessed to have the most awesome work force available to us within our community. Our team and volunteers are the best in the state, (in my humble opinion). #### Greetings fellow Santaquin Families,

Another month has passed, and we are now staring down the upcoming winter. I look forward to good snowstorms that bring us water in the mountains yet dread the thought of shoveling snow and the cold temperatures. In a few short

months it will pass and usher in a beautiful spring. The colors of the leaves in our canyon have been extraordinary this year. With our new mountain bike park making headway (see photo), this only signifies how beautiful our canyon really is.

This month, I want to say a few words on our efforts with UDOT and the work we have put in to help with Main Street and the traffic that effects all of us. In December last year, we met with the UDOT regional managers and engineers. The report at that time was that our interchange would not be considered for full reconstruction for at least 20 to 30 more years. We immediately got underway to investigate how this unacceptable timeframe could be moved up, so that our Main Street does not become the "Lehi Main Street of the south". With the increased growth and changes that will be coming, the upgrade of our Main Street from 300 East to approximately 500 West seems to indicate that it is even more important to rework our interchange and to begin a new layout that will enable a higher capacity of traffic at the interchange of Main street and I-15.



Along with the City staff, I have met with our federal congressional and senate leaders, state senators, state representatives, the senate president of Utah, lobbyists, Utah County Commissioners, and many others to start the process of helping us fix this problem in a much shorter timeframe. We have applied for Corridor Preservation funds to enable us to preserve the properties needed to reconfigure Santaquin City roads east of the interchange. We were awarded additional monies to study the traffic and find resolutions that will help our traffic operate more efficiently for years to come.

We have received over a million and a half dollars from Mountainland Association of Governments (MAG) to secure the properties and to do the studies. Behind the scenes of daily work, we have provided ideas and direction to make the changes needed at no cost to our citizens. The MAG staff has helped with direction and funding to start trimming down the unacceptable timeframe first presented to us last December.

In October, the monthly UDOT Transportation Commission meetings were held in our Public Safety building. We were able to have face to face opportunities and to take the commissioners and other public servants on a guided tour of our problem areas. During the tour and various meetings, we expressed our critical need to have UDOT completely reconstruct our Main Street interchange, which is the oldest interchange structure on the I-15 corridor from St. George to Plymouth Utah. I feel we have the ear and confidence of our elected officials and the UDOT Transportation Commissioners. With all these efforts and much more still to work on, we will succeed.
